While it's easier to send emails, and every senator and congressman already has an email address, written letters get more attention and have a greater impact. Senators and congressmen and their staff receive literally hundreds of emails every day. Emails from their constituents mix with emails from lawmakers and staff members, making them easy to ignore or ignore. You will find links to their website, email and phone number, and the address to the office in Washington D.C. The House of Representatives is a little trickier because you have to look for the person representing that district within the state. The easiest way to do this is to enter your zip code [House.gov](#) search for your representative. This narrows the options, but it may be refined based on the physical address because zip codes and congressional districts don't fall in agreement. In both houses of Congress, the congressman's official website also has all the contact information you need. This includes the location of local offices. The letter will be more effective when dealing with a topic or issue rather than the various issues you may feel passionate about. Typed, one-sided letters are the best. Many political action committees (PACs) recommend that a three-paragraph letter structured like this: Tell me why you write and who you are. List your credentials and specify that you are a voter. It also doesn't hurt to mention if you voted or donated to them. If you want to get a response, you'll need to enter your name and address, even if you're using an email. Enter more detail. Be factual and not emotional. Instead of general information, provide specific information about how the topic affects you and others. If a certain account is involved, quote the correct address or number whenever possible. Close by asking for the action you want. They may vote in favour or against a bill, a change in general policy or other action, but be specific. The best letters are polite, to the point, and contain concrete examples of support. Always proofread the letter before you post it. Read it at least twice, checking for spelling, punctuation, and grammatical errors. Make sure you haven't repeated yourself, not that your points are clear or left anything behind. A increase its credibility. Members of Congress have a lot of agendas, so it's best to put the issue on the agenda as accurately as possible. When you write a particular bill, or legislation, it contains the official number so you know exactly what it refers to (it also helps your credibility). Be polite and respectful without spilling. Tell me clearly and simply the purpose of your letter. If it's a particular account, identify it correctly. Tell me who you are. Anonymous letters don't lead anywhere. Even email your correct name, address, phone number, and email address. If you don't at least enter your name and address, you won't get an answer. Provide your professional credentials or personal experience, in particular those relating to the subject matter of the letter. Keep your letter short — a page is the best. Use specific examples or evidence to support your position. Tell us what you want to do or suggest a to-do list. Thank you to the member for taking the time to read your letter. Just because they represent voters doesn't mean members of Congress are subject to abuse or desensity. As passionate as you may be an issue, the letter will be more effective if it is written from a calm, logical point of view. If you're angry about something, write the letter and then edit it the next day to make sure you're conveyed in a polite, professional tone. Also, be sure to avoid these pitfalls. Don't use vulgarly, profanity, or threats. The first two are simply rude, and the third can visit the Secret Service. Simply put, don't let your passion get in the way of that point.
